Costs of Healthcare

The Committee will examine out-of-pocket costs in Australian healthcare, with particular reference to the current and future trends in out-of-pocket expenditure by Australian health consumers, the impact of co-payments on consumers' ability to access health care andhealth outcomes and costs and the effects of co-payments on other parts of the health system.

The Committee will also inquire into the implications for the ongoing sustainability of the health system, key areas of expenditure, including pharmaceuticals, primary care visits, medical devices or supplies, and dental care and the role of private health insurance.

Finally the Committee will examine the appropriateness and effectiveness of safety nets and other offsets and market drivers for costs in the Australian healthcare system.

The terms of reference, due date for submissions and reporting date will be published when available.

Care and management of younger and older Australians living with dementia and behavioural and psychiatric symptoms of dementia (BPSD)

This inquiry will report on the scope and adequacy of the different models of community, residential and acute care for Australians living with dementia and BPSD, with particular reference services provided both by the Commonwealth, State and Territories, and also the non-government sector. It will examine the resourcing of care and report on scope for improving care and management, increasing access to care and reducing physical and chemical restraints.

Submissions closed 03 May 2013. The reporting date was originally 26 June 2013 and was subsequently extended to 12 August 2013.

On 14 November 2013 the matter was re-referred to the Committee by the Senate for inquiry.

The Committee is due to report by 28 February 2014.

Grandparents who take primary responsibility for raising their grandchildren

The inquiry will examine Grandparents who take on the primary responsibility for raising their grandchildren when parents are unable or unwilling to do so, through a formal or informal care arrangement, including:

- the practical challenges facing grandparents raising grandchildren, and their support needs;
- recognising the role and contribution of grandparents raising their grandchildren;
- other challenges that grandparents raising their grandchildren face in undertaking their role, including in circumstances complicated by family conflict, mental illness, substance abuse, homelessness, child abuse or neglect, or family violence;
- legal barriers, including Legal Aid entitlements for grandparents seeking to formalise their custodial arrangements through the Family Law Courts;
- the practical measures that can be implemented by Federal, State and Territory governments and the community sector, including key priorities for action;
- the specific needs of particular groups within the caring population.

Prevalence of different types of speech, language and communication disorders and speech pathology services in Australia

This inquiry will examine the prevalence and instances of different types of speech, language and communication disorders and swallowing difficulties in Australia, the availability and adequacy of speech pathology services provided by the Commonwealth, state and local governments and across Australia, and the social and economic cost of failing to treat communication and swallowing disorders.

Reserve Bank Amendment (Australian Reconstruction and Development Board) Bill 2013

The Committee will examine the Private Member's bill of Senator John Madigan (DLP) and Senator Nick Xenophon, <u>Reserve Bank Amendment (Australian Reconstruction and Development Board) Bill</u> 2013, which creates a specific entity tasked with examining, reconstructing and improving the financial status of the Australian agricultural sector and its associated industries and infrastructures.

As such, the Bill establishes an 'Australian Reconstruction and Development Board' (ARDB) under the Reserve Bank, with the task of forming and implementing rural reconstruction and development policy.

The closing date for submissions is 10 February 2014.

The Committee is due to report by 26 March 2014.

Competition and Consumer Amendment (Misuse of Market Power) Bill 2014

The Committee will examine the <u>Competition and Consumer Amendment (Misuse of Market Power) Bill</u> 2014.

In undertaking the inquiry, the Committee will consider the application of the <u>Competition and</u> <u>Consumer Act 2010</u> with particular reference to provisions relating to competition and market power. The Committee will also examine the remedies available to the Courts and the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission regarding breaches of the Act and the current levels of competition in Australian markets and the impact on consumers and small businesses.

Submissions closing date has not yet been set.

The Committee is due to report by 24 June 2014.

Corporations Amendment (Streamlining of Future of Financial Advice) Bill 2014

The <u>Corporations Amendment (Streamlining of Future of Financial Advice) Bill 2014</u> implements the Coalition Government's election commitment to reduce compliance costs imposed on the financial services industry by amending Part 7.7A of the Corporations Act 2001 (Corporations Act). Part 7.7A is also referred to as Future of Financial Advice (FOFA).

The Future of Financial Advice (FoFA) legislation became mandatory for the financial services sector in July last year.

According to the Treasury website, the original objectives of the FoFA legislation was to 'improve the trust and confidence of Australian retail investors in the financial services sector and improve access to advice'.

Australia's Innovation System

The Committee will examine challenges to Australian industries and jobs posed by increasing global competition in innovation, science, engineering, research and education. In particular, the Committee will examine

- The need to attract new investment in innovation to secure high skill, high wage jobs and industries in Australia, as well as the role of public policy in nurturing a culture of innovation and a healthy innovation ecosystem;
- The Government's approach to innovation, especially with respect to the funding of education and research, the allocation of investment in industries, and the maintenance of capabilities across the economy;
- The importance of translating research output into social and economic benefits for Australians;
- The relationship between advanced manufacturing and a dynamic innovation culture;
- Potential governance and funding models for Australia's research infrastructure and agencies, and policy options to diversify science and research financing;
- Policy actions to attract, train and retain a healthy research and innovation workforce; and
- Policy options to create a seamless innovation pipeline, including support for emerging industries, with a view to identifying key areas of future competitive advantage.

The Committee is due to report by the first sitting day of July 2014.

Affordable housing

This inquiry will examine government policies to encourage home ownership and residential property investment and increase housing supply, including current taxes and levies, and the operation, effect and future of the National Rental Affordability Scheme.

The inquiry will also look at the regulatory structures governing the roles of financial institutions and superannuation funds in the home lending and property sectors, and the operation and effectiveness of rent and housing assistance programs.

The inquiry is broad in scope, and will report on implications for other related changes to Commonwealth government policies and programs, including taxation policy, aged care, disability services, Indigenous affairs and for state and territory governments. Construction, building materials, sustainability and the availability of an appropriately skilled workforce will also form part of the inquiry.

The Committee will look to other countries, including the United Kingdom, United States of America, France, Canada, Austria and the Netherlands, that provide a stable and cost effective way of funding affordable rental and social housing.

Finally, the Committee will examine the impact of not having a long-term, national affordable housing plan.

The performance of the Australian Securities and Investments Commission

This inquiry will examine aspects of the performance of ASIC. In particular, it will look at the effectiveness of ASIC's enabling legislation, the accountability framework to which ASIC is subject, the workings of ASIC's collaboration with other regulators and law enforcement bodies, its complaints management policies and practices and the protections afforded by ASIC to corporate and private whistleblowers.

Fair Work Amendment Bill 2014

The Fair Work Amendment Bill 2014 makes amendments to the Fair Work Act 2009 (Fair Work Act) to implement various elements of Government policy. Specifically, the Bill responds to a number of outstanding recommendations from the June 2012 review into the operation of the Fair Work Act by the Fair Work Review Panel. The Bill proposes to amend the Fair Work Act to respond to the following Fair Work Review Panel Recommendations:

- Recommendation 2 employees do not accrue annual leave while absent from work and in receipt of workers' compensation payments)
- Recommendation 3 (requires employers and employees hold a meeting to discuss a request for extended unpaid parental leave, unless the employer has agreed to the request)
- Recommendation 6 annual leave loading is not payable on termination of employment unless a modern award or enterprise agreement expressly provides to that effect.
- Recommendation 9 the better off overall test in s. 144(4)(c) and s. 203(4) be amended to expressly permit an individual flexibility arrangement to confer a non-monetary benefit on an employee in exchange for a monetary benefit
- Recommendation 11 provides a defence to an alleged contravention of a flexibility term under s. 145(3) or s. 204(3) where an employer has complied with the notification requirements and believed, on reasonable grounds, that all other statutory requirements were met
- Recommendation 12 increasing the maximum notice period from 28 days to 90 days in certain circumstances
- Recommendation 24 permits individual flexibility arrangements to deal with all the matters listed in paragraph 1(a) of the model flexibility term in Schedule 2.2 of the FW Regulations
- Recommendation 28 employers intending to negotiate a s. 172(2)(b) greenfields agreement to take all reasonable steps to notify all unions with eligibility to represent relevant employees
- Recommendation 31 an application for a protected action ballot order may only be made
- when bargaining for a proposed agreement has commenced
- Recommendation 43 FWA is not required to hold a hearing when exercising powers to dismiss an application under s. 587, nor when exercising the recommended powers to dismiss an application involving a settlement agreement or a failure by an applicant to attend a proceeding or comply with an FWA direction or order.

The Bill also proposes to establish a new process for negotiation of single enterprise greenfields agreements, amend the right of entry framework of the Fair Work Act, and provide for the Fair Work Ombudsman to pay interest on unclaimed monies.

Social Security Legislation Amendment (Green Army Programme) Bill 2014

The <u>Social Security Legislation Amendment (Green Army Programme) Bill 2014</u> proposes to amend the: <u>Social Security Act 1991</u> to specify that persons receiving a green army allowance under the Green Army Programme (GAP) cannot also receive a social security benefit or pension. The Bill also provides that certain participants in the GAP are not considered 'workers or employees' for the purposes of various laws and specifies the income testing arrangements to apply to a social security pensioner if their partner is receiving a green army allowance and <u>Social Security (Administration) Act 1999</u> to make consequential amendments.

The closing date for submissions is 17 April 2014.

The Committee is due to report by 13 May 2014.

Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency Amendment Bill 2014

The <u>Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency Amendment Bill 2014</u> proposes to amend the <u>Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency Act 2011</u> in relation to:

- quality assessments of higher education providers; the delegation of decisions;
- the appointment of commissioners;
- extending periods of accreditation or registration;
- the roles and responsibilities of the Chief Commissioner and Chief Executive Officer;
- notifying providers of decisions; the scope of ministerial directions; and
- Ministerial approval being required for legislative instruments which determine fees to be charged.

The closing date for submissions is 2 May 2014.

The Committee is due to report by 16 June 2014.

There is currently a separate House of Representatives Committee examining the TAFE system.

The immediate future of the childcare sector in Australia

This inquiry will examine the cost and availability of childcare for parents over the short term, including the effectiveness of the current government rebates, the administrative burden (including the impact of the introduction of the National Quality Framework) on childcare, the impact of the current regulatory environment, and methods to strengthen the sector in the short term to boost Australia's productivity and workplace participation for parents.

The Committee is due to report by 17 June 2014.

The delivery of quality and affordable early childhood education and care services

This inquiry will look at the outcomes for children in early childhood education and care services, including workforce factors such as stability, qualifications and wage rates, quality regulation (including staff-to-child ratios), participation and access to services, and environments for learning.

The Inquiry will also produce a progress report into the implementation of the National Quality Framework (NQF), including parents' experiences of the outcomes of the NQF, the impacts of the announced government amendments to the NQF, and the outcomes for children and early childhood education and care services.

Submissions are currently open.

The Committee is due to report by 17 June 2014.

Technical and further education (TAFE) in Australia

The inquiry will examine the role of TAFEs in linking with secondary and higher education, developing skills in the Australian economy, and enabling Australians to improve themselves and increase their life, education and employment prospects, and the delivery of services and programs to support regions, communities and disadvantaged individuals to access education, training and skills and, through them, a pathway to further education and employment.

More specifically, the inquiry will examine the effect of a competitive training market on TAFE and the level and allocation of public funding for TAFE and its accessibility, including the application and effect of additional charges to TAFE students.

The inquiry is required to consider any public information provided to the 2013 House of Representatives inquiry by the Standing Committee on Education and Employment on the <u>role of the</u> <u>technical and further education system and its operation</u>; and to public hearings in all capital cities, with a minimum of Melbourne, Sydney, Perth and Brisbane, as well as a major regional centre in either New South Wales or Victoria.

The Committee is due to report by 13 May 2014.

A <u>separate inquiry into the role of the Technical and Further Education system</u> and its operation is currently being undertaken by the House Standing Committee on Education and Employment.

The Government's approach to re-establishing the Australian Building and Construction Commission

The inquiry will examine the potential impact of the re-establishment of the Australian Building and Construction Commission on the building and construction industry. In particular, it will look at the need or otherwise for a specialist industrial regulator in the industry, the impact of the Bill, whether it is consistent with Australia's obligations under international law;

The inquiry will also examine the potential impact of the bills on employees, employers, employer bodies, trade and labour councils, unions and union members.

The proposed powers of the Australian Building and Construction Commission will also be reviewed, including coercive powers, conduct of compulsory interviews (including the absence of a guarantee to a right to silence), and imprisonment for those who do not co-operate.

The particular provisions of the bills that introduce the law of conspiracy into the industrial regulation of the building and construction industry will also be a focus for the inquiry.

Provisions of the Fair Work (Registered Organisations) Amendment Bill 2013

The Inquiry will examine the potential impact of the amendments to interfere with the ongoing operation of registered organisations in Australia and the potential of the amendments to impede the ability of employees of registered organisations to carry out their duties.

Australia Post in Australian communities

The inquiry was established on 14 November 2013 and will report on the overall performance, importance and role of Australia Post in Australian communities, and the challenges it faces in the immediate and longer term. It will also examine the operations of Australia Post in relation to Licensed Post Offices (LPOs), with particular reference to regional LPOs, the licensing and trading conditions applicable to LPOs and the marketing, retail and trading arrangements between Australia Post and LPOs and other entities.

The closing date for submissions is 25 November 2013.

The Committee was due to report by 11 December 2013. On 11 December 2013, the Senate granted an extension to the reporting date until 31 March 2014.

Telecommunications Legislation Amendment (Submarine Cable Protection) Bill 2013

The inquiry will examine the <u>Telecommunications Legislation Amendment (Submarine Cable</u> <u>Protection) Bill 2013</u> with regards to the vulnerability of Australia's telecommunications cables carrying international and domestic traffic to interception has been the subject of recent reporting.

It is unclear whether the oversight mechanisms proposed are sufficient and whether the streamlining of permits processes outlined improve the security of this telecommunications infrastructure.

Schedule 3A to the Act currently sets out a regulatory scheme that only captures cables that enter Australia's territorial sea and land in Australia. The aim of the regime is to minimise the risk to submarine cables from human activity, particularly some kinds of fishing, anchoring of vessels and dredging.

Schedule 3A gives the industry regulator, ACMA, the power to establish protection zones around existing or planned submarine cables of national significance and regulate activities of vessels and persons within protection zones.

Schedule 3A also establishes an installation permit system for international submarine cables connecting to Australia.

Environmental Offsets

The Committee will examine the history, appropriateness and effectiveness of the use of environmental offsets in federal environmental approvals in Australia. It will have particular regard to the principles that underpin the use of offsets, the processes used to develop and assess proposed offsets and the adequacy of monitoring and evaluation of approved offsets arrangements to determine whether promised environmental outcomes are achieved over the short and long term.

It will have specific regard to, but not be restricted to, the following projects: Whitehaven Coal's Maules Creek Project; Waratah Coal's Galilee Coal Project; QGC's Queensland Curtis LNG project; North Queensland Bulk Port's Abbot Point Coal Terminal Capital Dredging Project; and Jandakot Airport developments.

The Committee is due to report by 16 June 2014.

Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area

The Committee will inquire and report on the natural world heritage values of the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area minor boundary extension passed by the World Heritage Committee in June 2013. It will examine the interaction between the Department of the Environment and the Prime Minister and other ministers' offices, and the process followed in the department's review of the 2013 extension that led to a lesser minor boundary extension being submitted for consideration at the 2014 World Heritage Committee meeting.

ISDS clauses are designed to allow foreign corporations to sue governments if their business activities and interests are impinged on by the policy and legislative decisions of the government.

There are ISDS clauses in a number of Australia's agreements with other countries, including in the recently signed Korea Australia Free Trade Agreement (KAFTA), the Singapore FTA, the Chile FTA, the ASEAN FTA and the Thai FTA. It is believed that the Trans-Pacific partnership agreement which is currently under negotiation has ISDS clauses on the table as well.

The Australian Government is currently being sued under ISDS clauses over plain packaging.
